SHARING THE PATH OF FAITH

reflections from the clergy and our parish community

Dear friends,

There is a behind-the-scenes quality to St Eanswythe.

She was the granddaughter of a tribal king named Eadbald in the seventh century – in Kent, England.

Her grandfather was the first English king to embrace the Christian faith. When her father came to the throne, he had a falling out with the church. Eanswythe wasn't shaken and persuaded him to establish a monastery for women, for her to join. At sixteen she was among the founding members. Within a year or a few years, she became its first abbess. A matter of years or perhaps months later, she died—somewhere between the age of 17 and 22—possibly from the plague, which came in waves in seventh-century England.

Beyond local history in the Folkstone area, she was largely forgotten.

In 1885 some repairs were being made to the one church in England dedicated to Eanswythe (& Mary), in Folkstone – and workers stumbled upon her relics! They found a cavity in a wall with a casket hidden inside it. The casket dated back to the twelfth century, and the human remains inside to the seventh. The casket was possibly hidden in the wall to protect it from King Henry VIII's men, when they were confiscating sacred vessels and relics during the English Reformation.

Forgive me if you know this story.

It has been a delight for me to learn the story.

I love that this church is dedicated to her: a young woman who might have been the daughter of kings. Plague was often present. The changeable attitude of her father and kin to the new religion was there, too. But in this simple way she set her mind on divine rather than human things (see today's Gospel), died herself, took up her cross and followed him. And so, she dedicated her brief life in a way that we can still draw strength from all these centuries later.

She might have been forgotten for centuries, but she has been 'up there', interceding—and waiting for a little community like this one, half a world away, to call upon her prayers.

Grace to you and spiritual blessings in abundance this week.

FIRST READING

A reading from the book of Proverbs

Wisdom shouts in the street;
in the public square she raises her voice.

Above the noisy crowd, she calls out.
At the entrances of the city gates, she has her say:
"How long will you clueless people love your naïveté, mockers hold their mocking dear, and fools hate knowledge?
You should respond when I correct you.

Look, I'll pour out my spirit on you.

I'll reveal my words to you.

I invited you, but you rejected me;

I stretched out my hand to you, but you paid no attention.

You ignored all my advice,

and you didn't want me to correct you.

So I'll laugh at your disaster;

I'll make fun of you when dread comes over you, when terror hits you like a hurricane, and your disaster comes in like a tornado, when distress and oppression overcome you.

Then they will call me, but I won't answer; they will seek me, but won't find me because they hated knowledge and didn't choose the fear of the Lord.

They didn't want my advice;

they rejected all my corrections.

They will eat from the fruit of their way, and they'll be full of their own schemes.

The immature will die because they turn away; smugness will destroy fools.

Those who obey me will dwell securely, untroubled by the dread of harm."

PSALM

The heavens declare the glory of God: and the firmament proclaims his handiwork;

There is no speech or language: nor are their voices heard:

There he has pitched a tent for the sun: which comes out as a bridegroom from his chamber, and rejoices like a strong man to run his course.

Its rising is at one end of the heavens, and its circuit to their farthest bound: and nothing is hidden from its heat.

SECOND READING

A reading from the letter of James

Someone might claim, "You have faith and I have action." But how can I see your faith apart from your actions? Instead, I'll show you my faith by putting it into practice in faithful action. It's good that you believe that God is one. Ha! Even the demons believe this, and they tremble with fear. Are you so slow? Do you need to be shown that faith without actions has no value at all? What about Abraham, our father? Wasn't he shown to be righteous through his actions when he offered his son Isaac on the altar? See, his faith was at work along with his actions. In fact, his faith was made complete by his faithful actions. So the scripture was fulfilled that says, Abraham believed God, and God regarded him as righteous. What is more, Abraham was called God's friend. So you see that a person is shown to be righteous through faithful actions and not through faith alone. In the same way, wasn't Rahab the prostitute shown to be righteous when she received the messengers as her guests and then sent them on by another road? As the lifeless body is dead, so faith without actions is dead.

THE GOSPEL

A reading from the Gospel according to Mark

Jesus and his disciples went into the villages near Caesarea Philippi. On the way he asked his disciples, "Who do people say that I am?"

They told him, "Some say John the Baptist, others Elijah, and still others one of the prophets."

He asked them, "And what about you? Who do you say that I am?"

Peter answered, "You are the Christ." Jesus ordered them not to tell anyone about him.

Then Jesus began to teach his disciples: "The Human One must suffer many things and be rejected by the elders, chief priests, and the legal experts, and be killed, and then, after three days, rise from the dead." He said this plainly. But Peter took hold of Jesus and, scolding him, began to correct him. Jesus turned and looked at his disciples, then sternly corrected Peter:

"Get behind me, Satan. You are not thinking God's thoughts but human thoughts."

After calling the crowd together with his disciples, Jesus said to them, "All who want to come after me must say no to themselves, take up their cross, and follow me. All who want to save their lives will lose them. But all who lose their lives because of me and because of the good news will save them. Why would people gain the whole world but lose their lives? What will people give in exchange for their lives? Whoever is ashamed of me and my words in this unfaithful and sinful generation, the Human One will be ashamed of that person when he comes in the Father's glory with the holy angels."
