Gathering in God's name

We meet in God's name, as God's people – children of God in all our rich diversity, with all that we carry from the complexity of our lives.

We turn to God in praise and prayer; this includes recalling all that has separated us from God, and claiming the love and forgiveness that is always held out to us.

The Collect then 'collects' these prayers and turns our attention towards the Bible readings which will follow.

CONFESSION AND ABSOLUTION

THE COLLECT (PRAYER OF THE DAY)

Opening the Scriptures

FIRST READING:

A reading from the book of Genesis (24.34-38, 42-49, 58-67)

So he said, 'I am Abraham's servant. The Lord has greatly blessed my master, and he has become wealthy; he has given him flocks and herds, silver and gold, male and female slaves, camels and donkeys. And Sarah my master's wife bore a son to my master when she was old; and he has given him all that he has. My master made me swear, saying, "You shall not take a wife for my son from the daughters of the Canaanites, in whose land I live; but you shall go to my father's house, to my kindred, and get a wife for my son." 'I came today to the spring, and said, "O Lord, the God of my master Abraham, if now you will only make successful the way I am going! I am standing here by the spring of water; let the young woman who comes out to draw, to whom I shall say, 'Please give me a little water from your jar to drink,' and who will say to me, 'Drink, and I will draw for your camels also'—let her be the woman whom the Lord has appointed for my master's son." 'Before I had finished speaking in my heart, there was Rebekah coming out with her water-iar on her shoulder; and she went down to the spring, and drew. I said to her, "Please let me drink." She quickly let down her jar from her shoulder, and said, "Drink, and I will also water your camels." So I drank, and she also watered the camels. Then I asked her, "Whose daughter are you?" She said, "The daughter of Bethuel, Nahor's son, whom Milcah bore to him." So I put the ring on her nose, and the bracelets on her arms. Then I bowed my head and worshipped the Lord, and blessed the Lord, the God of my master Abraham, who had led me by the right way to obtain the daughter of my master's kinsman for his son. Now then, if you will deal loyally and truly with my master, tell me; and if not, tell me, so that I may turn either to the right hand or to the left.' And they called Rebekah, and said to her, 'Will you go with this man?' She said, 'I will.' So they sent away their sister Rebekah and her nurse along with Abraham's servant and his men. And they blessed Rebekah and said to her, 'May you, our sister, become thousands of myriads; may your offspring gain possession of the gates of their foes.' Then Rebekah and her maids rose up, mounted the camels, and followed the man; thus the servant took Rebekah, and went his way. Now Isaac had come from Beer-lahai-roi, and was settled in the Negeb. Isaac went out in the evening to walk in the field; and looking up, he saw camels coming. And Rebekah looked up, and when she saw Isaac, she slipped quickly from the camel, and said to the servant, 'Who is the man over there, walking in the field to meet us?' The servant said, 'It is my master.' So she took her veil and covered herself. And the servant told Isaac all the things that he had done. Then Isaac brought her into his mother Sarah's tent. He took Rebekah, and she became his wife; and he loved her. So Isaac was comforted after his mother's death.

Hear the word of the Lord. Thanks be to God.

PSALM: (45.10-17)

Hear, O daughter, consider and incline your ear: forget your own people and your father's house.

The king desires your beauty: he is your lord, therefore bow down before him. The richest among the people, O daughter of Tyre: shall entreat your favour with gifts.

The king's daughter is all glorious within: her clothing is embroidered cloth-of-gold.

In robes of many colours she is led to you, O king: and, after her, the virgins that are with her.

They are led with gladness and rejoicing: they enter the palace of the king. In place of your fathers you shall have sons: and make them princes over all the land.

And I will make known your name to every generation: therefore the peoples shall give you praise for ever.

SECOND READING:

A reading from the letter of Paul to the Romans (7.14-25)

For we know that the law is spiritual; but I am of the flesh, sold into slavery under sin. I do not understand my own actions. For I do not do what I want, but I do the very thing I hate. Now if I do what I do not want, I agree that the law is good. But in fact it is no longer I that do it, but sin that dwells within me. For I know that nothing good dwells within me, that is, in my flesh. I can will what is right, but I cannot do it. For I do not do the good I want, but the evil I do not want is what I do. Now if I do what I do not want, it is no longer I that do it, but sin that dwells within me. So I find it to be a law that when I want to do what is good, evil lies close at hand. For I delight in the law of God in my inmost self, but I see in my members another law at war with the law of my mind, making me captive to the law of sin that dwells in my members. Wretched man that I am! Who will rescue me from this body of death? Thanks be to God through Jesus Christ our Lord! So then, with my mind I am a slave to the law of God, but with my flesh I am a slave to the law of sin .

SERMON

NICENE CREED

We believe in one God. the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen. We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. through him all things were made. For us men and for our salvation he came down from heaven: was incarnate of the Holy Spirit and the Virgin Mary, and became truly human. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate: he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end. We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son he is worshipped and glorified. who has spoken through the Prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of Sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead. and the life of the world to come. Amen.

A Message from Rev'd Dave Thompson

In Matthew this week we see Jesus using an analogy to show that the people of his generation were fickle and inconsistent in their response to the truth. They complained about both John the Baptist and Jesus, unwilling to accept their messages or meet their expectations of how they should be. But life was no easy road back then. The religious leaders added to the burden of people with their heavy expectations. The people were being subjugated and could not respond joyfully to the Good News that Jesus offered on behalf of God. Religion had become so overladen with rules, laws and benefited only for those who could succeed: the wise and the learned. Jesus therefore highlights that God has chosen to reveal the truth to those who are humble and open to receiving it, like little children, rather than those who rely on their own wisdom and understanding. This may be because the wise and learned often have preconceived notions, agendas and expectations that can hinder their ability to accept the truth of the gospel and be prepared to follow. Jesus' speaks about a faith that reflects taking on a 'yoke' (Book of Wisdom: taking on the Torah) which means becoming his disciples. In this case it is a relationship rather than a book of law where disciples are ready to explore and learn how to live-out this new life that is granted. Jesus' yoke represents his teachings and guidance, which are meant to be easy and light compared to the rules of the religious systems of the day; increased by the burdens of sin and the expectations of the religious leaders of his time. We can find rest in Jesus by coming to him with our burdens, trusting in his teachings, and following his guidance; recognizing our need for his grace and mercy and being willing to learn from him and grow in our relationship with him. You know we all come to church with concerns, worries, burdens some may be quite "weary and carrying heavy burdens"; we all at times deeply long for rest. To all who are weary to the bone and weighed down, Jesus says, "Come to me... and I will give you rest." Following him might be full of risks and challenges, as he has made abundantly clear. He calls us to a life of humble service, but it is a life of freedom and joy instead of slavery...free to respond as we are not compromised by our own sense of self- righteousness or wisdom. It is life yoked to Jesus under God's gracious and merciful reign, free from the burden of sin and the need to prove oneself, free to rest deeply and securely in God's grace. And this is a new day for many.~ Regards, Dave
