For thus says the LORD God: I myself will search for my sheep, and will seek them out. As shepherds seek out their flocks when they are among their scattered sheep, so I will seek out my sheep. I will rescue them from all the places to which they have been scattered on a day of clouds and thick darkness. I will bring them out from the peoples and gather them from the countries, and will bring them into their own land; and I will feed them on the mountains of Israel, by the watercourses, and in all the inhabited parts of the land. All the nations will be gathered before him, and he will separate people one from another as a shepherd separates the sheep from the goats, and he will put the sheep at his right hand and the goats at the left. Then the king will say to those at his right hand, "Come, you that are blessed by my Father,

inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world; for I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, I was naked and you gave me clothing, I was sick and you took care of me, I was in prison and you visited me." Then the righteous will answer him, "Lord, when was it that we saw you hungry and gave you food, or thirsty and gave you something to drink? And when was it that we saw you a stranger and welcomed you, or naked and gave you clothing? And when was it that we saw you sick or in prison and visited you?" And the king will answer them, "Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me." Then he will say to those at his left hand, "You that are accursed, depart from me into the eternal fire prepared for the devil and his angels; for I was hungry and you gave me no food, I was thirsty and you gave me nothing to drink, I was a stranger and you did not welcome me, naked and you did not give me clothing, sick and in prison and you did not visit me." Then they also will answer, "Lord, when was it that we saw you hungry or thirsty or a stranger or naked or sick or in prison, and did not take care of you?" Then he will answer them, "Truly I tell you, just as you did not do it to one of the least of these, you did not do it to me." And these will go away into eternal punishment, but the righteous into eternal life.'

SERMON

NICENE CREED

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth. of all that is, seen and unseen. Intinction for the Receival of Wine in Holy Communion: Hello everyone. I have received authority form Bishop Brad to offer Intinction for the receival of the wine in Holy Communion. This is in view of the continued growth of Covid and the remaining sensitively to the consumption of the wine form the single Chalice. I ran this past the clergy attached to our parish last week. What this looks like would be: one of the stewards would remain close to the president as they distribute the Host. Parishioners can indicate whether they would prefer Intinction or wait for the single chalice. If you indicate a preference of Intinction...the president will dip the Host into the chalice that is near, dip it and pass it to the parishioner. If you indicate a preference for the single chalice, the president will hand you the host and you can take the wine from the second chalice as it is offered by this steward. I offer this in view that there are allsorts of good reasons to take the wine from the single chalice as there is utilising the art of Intinction. It is the Bishop's preference that only the priest 'dips' the host into the chalice for Intinction. The offer is made in view of what I have stated above. I hope this assist people in their worship. 

A Message from Rev'd Dave Thompson

Good morning, afternoon and evening to you all! Today we celebrate the Feast of St Clements. For our parish, we therefore celebrate one of our parish patronal saints on the nearest Sunday which is November the 26th. The actual day is November the 23rd. We draw together to reflect on st Clement as we did for St Eanswythe (the 17th of September) to reflect on the life of the parish and what we have gained and achieved and therefore celebrate as a church of Jesus Christ. Like the saints that go before us we reflect on the energy, focus and contribution that Clement and Easnwythe provided to the life of witness to the Lord. They found as we do still to this day many years later the sometimes unbelievable reality of the Lord's presence granted through the Holy Spirit when we call 'upon His name' and continue witnessing to His glory. What we do in His name is often varied and draws upon various gifts that people offer and use. This is the challenge that last week's Gospel reading of Matthew 25:14-30 and continued during the week with the reading from Luke in 19:11 -28 where the churches to whom Matthew and Luke respectively wrote to found themselves dealing with the long time between Jesus promise of His return and the delay in its arrival. Their communities were going through enormous challenge and in various cases some persecution and so the Gospel writers wrote remembering the stories of Jesus motivating their people to hang on in there....they like us some 20 centuries later find that when we act in His name, when we call upon His name and His power in the Spirit, enormous benefits and outcomes to ministry are found. Indeed, they find that they can do incredible things which led them see experience the reality of the Lord being present with them...the Lord was present just one step ahead of them! I remember a quote from Mother Teresa explaining why she was so motivated to minister to the poor, outcast and leprous people she attended to. She replied: in their eyes, I am drawn to compassion and I see in them the Lord's eyes looking back at me...with thanks and I feel His presence everywhere. (edit: DT) Clement, Easnwythe, all of us are drawn to the expression of faith in service to others...the act of loving our neighbour as ourselves. Today we celebrate all that we have received in Christ Jesus exemplified by these Parton Saints who gave so much to our Lord and His church. The miracles remain: of normal ordinary people doing extraordinary things empowered by the Holy Spirit to act their faith in ways that makes a difference to the people and communities. We give thanks to God for their life of witness. Amen. Grace & Blessings to you all!. Regards: Dave
