

Message from Rev'd Dave Thompson

Hi everyone.

It is now the season of Lent. Lent is a 40-day season observed by many Christians. It begins on Ash Wednesday and concludes at sundown on Holy Thursday. Ash Wednesday was celebrated on Wednesday the 14th with many of us observing the tradition of marking our forehead with ashes which dates back to the 11th century. It symbolizes penance and the recognition of our mortality. Lent is a time of prayer, fasting, and giving. It's a period of preparation leading up to the celebration of Christ's resurrection on Easter.

There's many things we can practice during Lent:-

Prayer: We seek the Lord through Sacred Scripture; deep prayer, sitting in garden space perceiving God's Spirit.

Fasting: We practice self-control, which may involve fasting from food or other things.

Almsgiving: We serve by giving to others.

Opportunities for Commitment: Lent provides an opportunity to recommit to things we know we need to do. Whether it's prayer, meditation, fasting, or acts of kindness,

Lent encourages us to take 40 days to focus on these commitments. And you know what? Below is something I often discover during the season of Lent:-



I say this over and over again during Lent in my morning prayers and well, anytime I turn my attention to God. N.T. Wright stated: "Lent is a time for discipline, for confession, for honesty, not because God is mean or fault-finding, but because He wants us to know the joy of being cleaned out, ready for all the good things He now has in store". A direct, down to earth open and honest relationship with God! So get the candles out, create a quiet reserved space, get the prayer books, meditation guides, Desert Father statements & quotes...light some incense and concentrate on your breath...sit with it, don't punish yourself when your mind goes wandering bring it back....by listening to your breath and say these words to yourself: Jesus, Son of God, Have mercy on me. Always finish with the quote from Lamentations. Amen.
